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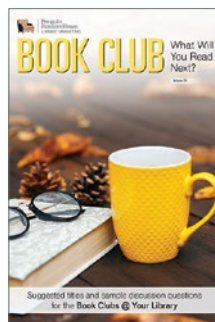
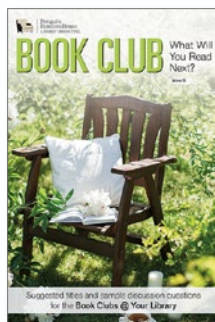

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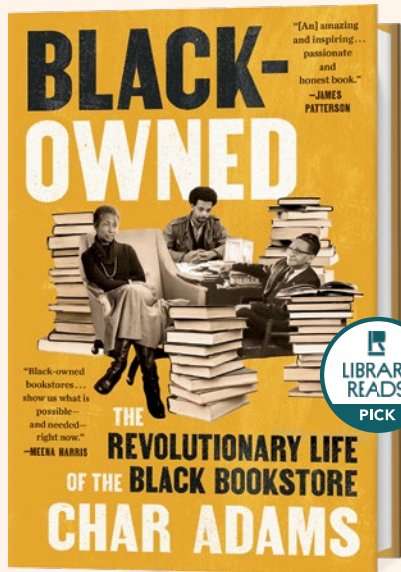

ABOUT THE BOOK:

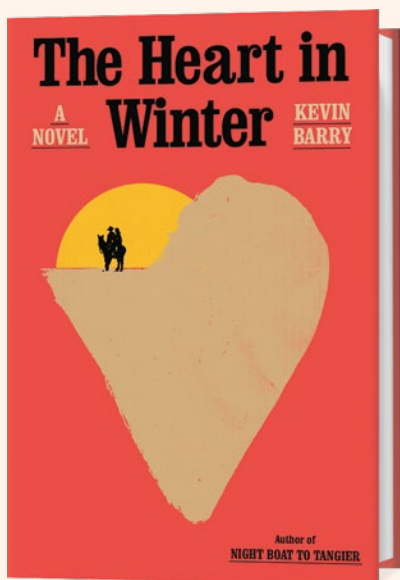

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. What's the most memorable experience you've had at a bookstore?
2. Why do you think bookselling and activism have intersected so often in American history?

4. Black bookstores faced backlash from individuals and government agencies. Why were Black bookstores seen as a threat?
5. Drum and Spear expanded from bookselling into book publishing—in what ways do authors, bookstores, and book presses interact in this book?

ABOUT THE BOOK:

October 1891. A hard winter approaches across the Rocky Mountains. The city of Butte, Montana is rich on copper mines and rampant with vice and debauchery among a hard-living crowd of immigrant Irish workers. Here we find Tom Rourke, a young poet and ballad-maker of the town, but also a doper, a drinker, and a fearsome degenerate. Just as he feels his life is heading nowhere fast, Polly Gillespie arrives in town as the new bride of the extremely devout mine captain Long Anthony Harrington. A thunderbolt love affair takes spark between Tom and Polly and they strike out west on a stolen horse, moving through the badlands of Montana and Idaho, and briefly an idyll of wild romance perfects itself. But a posse of deranged Cornish gunmen are soon in hot pursuit and closing in fast. With everything to lose and the safety and anonymity of San Francisco still a distant speck on their horizon, the choices they make will haunt them for the rest of their lives.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. What aspects of Tom's personality make him suspect among the authorities of Butte? How might his more artistic and mystical interests have been received if he was living in a different time period?
2. Discuss the drifter characters that Tom and Polly meet on the road.
3. The townspeople describe Tom as having "a kind of witchery about him." What events lead them to this conclusion? What does it mean during this time for a man to be labeled with that word?
4. What aspects of Irish culture have become embedded in Butte?
5. Describe the couple's connection to their horse. Why does selling her seem like such a betrayal? How does Tom anthropomorphize the horse in his mind and behaviors?

ABOUT THE BOOK:

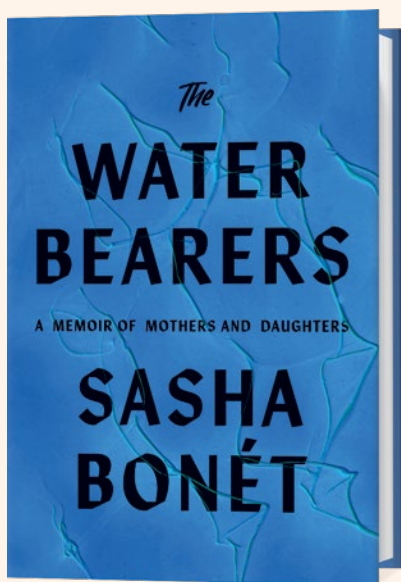

This time, the Cold War threatens to undermine the Queen's upcoming visit to Italy. She and Joan must tackle dark forces that follow them all the way in a tale of spies, lies, and treachery.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. This mystery starts with a body seen from a passing train window. Why do you think trains are popular settings for crime fiction?
2. The characters in this book find themselves at a dangerous time in history, at the height of the Cold War and the Space Race. How do you think this compares with the times we live in today?
3. The Queen has some hard choices to make between protecting one of the main assets she needs to do her job and protecting two strangers. Would you have made the same decisions?
4. Joan McGraw enjoys her high-level access to interesting people and state secrets, but she must deal with palace protocol. Is this a job you would love, or hate?
5. The mystery seems to be resolved, until the Queen has a revelation and there is a final twist. How important is a good twist to your enjoyment of crime novels?

ABOUT THE BOOK:

Sasha Bonét grew up in 1990s Houston, worlds removed from the Louisiana cotton plantation that raised her grandmother, Betty Jean, and the Texas bayous that shaped Sasha's mother, Connie. And though each generation did better, materially, than the last, all of them carried the complex legacy of Black American motherhood with its origins in slavery. All of them knew that the hands used to comb and braid hair, shell pecans, and massage weary muscles were the very hands used to whip children into submission.

When she had her own daughter, Sofia, Bonét was determined to interrupt this tradition. She brought Sofia to New York and set off on a journey—not only up and down the tributaries of her bloodline but also into the lives of Black women in history and literature—Betty Davis, Recy Taylor, and Iberia Hampton among them—to understand both the love and pain they passed on to their children and to create a way of mothering that honors the legacy but abandons the violence that shaped it.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. What does the title *The Waterbearers* mean to you after reading the book?
2. What themes do you recognize that are threaded throughout the book? How are these themes connected to what we are collectively experiencing in the world today?
3. How do you see motherhood and womanhood defined in this book? Do you feel there are any distinctions made between the two?
4. What differences and similarities do you see among Betty Jean, Connie, and Sasha?
5. Which one of Betty Jean's daughters stood out the most to you and why?

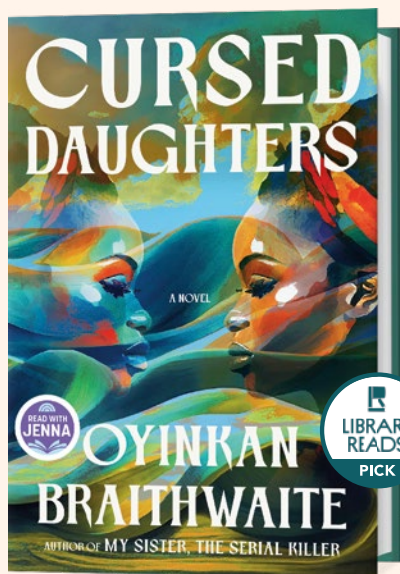

ABOUT THE BOOK:

When Ebum gives birth to her daughter, Eniyyi, on the day they bury her cousin Monife, there is no denying the startling resemblance between the child and the dead woman. So begins the belief that Eniyyi is the actual reincarnation of Monife, fated to follow in her footsteps in all ways, including that tragic end.

There is also the matter of the family curse which has been handed down from generation to generation, breaking hearts and causing three generations of abandoned Falodun women to live under the same roof. But when Eniyyi falls in love with the handsome boy she saves from drowning, she can no longer run from her family's history.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. The Falodun women are cursed that “No man will call your house, home. And if they try, they will not have peace.” Generations later 12-year-old Ebum tells her 16-year-old cousin Monife that she doesn’t believe in curses. Monife replies “what if the curse believes in you?” Do you think the curse is real? How do you think the curse impacted each generation of the Falodun family differently?
2. Which of the Falodun women did you connect with most and why?
3. Do you see *Cursed Daughters* as a love story?
4. The Falodun women are fiercely protective, but also sensitive. How do you see them showing up for each other (or sometimes failing to do so) throughout the story? How about their uncle Tolu?
5. What did you think of the different ways of dealing with the curse. What do you think Ebum and Eniyyi end up believing about their own destiny? What do you think the future holds for the Falodun women?

ABOUT THE BOOK:

London, Present Day: When American expat Margo Reynolds is hired to source a book that has only one copy in existence, it quickly becomes clear that her client isn't the only person determined to procure the book at any cost and she is thrust into a deadly quest.

Havana, 1966: Pilar Castillo's days are spent working at a library in Havana. But Pilar has a secret that could jeopardize her life. She's fighting Fidel's regime in her own way, and when she comes into possession of a book that was published more than sixty years earlier, she must decide how much she's willing to risk to protect the literary works entrusted to her care.

Boston, 1900: Cuban teacher Eva Fuentes, travels from Havana to Harvard. When a moonlit encounter with an enigmatic stranger alters the course of Eva's summer at Harvard, and as secrets, lies, and forbidden love rise to the surface, Eva's life—and legacy—is irrevocably changed.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. The novel alternates between three heroines in three different time periods—Eva in 1900, Pilar in 1966, and Margo in 2024. Which heroine did you identify with most?
2. All three heroines are trying to find their place in society and their purpose in the times in which they live. How do they find their voices? What empowers them? What challenges do they face?
3. *The Lost Story of Eva Fuentes* centers around a novel that changes the lives of the three main characters in different ways. Is there a special book that has changed your life?
4. Pilar believes that if someone doesn't love to read, it's because they haven't found the right book for them yet. Have you been a lifelong reader or was there a specific book or event that ignited your love of reading?

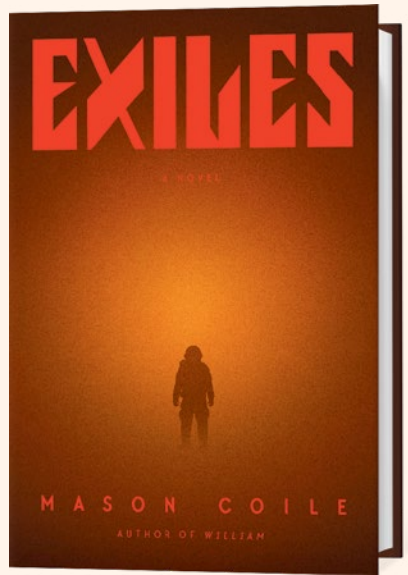

ABOUT THE BOOK:

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

4. How might *Exiles* have read differently if it were told from the bots' point of view? What might you have learned about the crew members of the *Valiant*, and humanity in general?
5. What do you think this book is trying to say about human colonization and technological advancement?
6. Were you surprised by the novel's ending?

ABOUT THE BOOK:

Like everyone else in the settlement of Mistaken, Greer Mackenzie is trapped. Founded by an ambitious lumber merchant, the village is blessed with rich natural resources that have made its people prosperous—but at a cost. The same woods that have lined the townsfolk's pockets harbor dangerous beasts: wolves, bears, and the Bright-Eyeds—monsters beyond description who have rained utter destruction down on nearby settlements. But Mistaken's founders made a deal with the mysterious Benevolence: the Warding Stones that surround the town will keep the Bright-Eyeds out—and the town's citizens in. Anyone who spends a night within Mistaken's borders belongs to it forever.

One morning though, Greer watches in horror as her beloved disappears beyond the Warding Stones, pursued by a monstrous creature. Determined to rescue him, she figures out a way to defy Mistaken's curse and begins a trek through the cold and pitiless wilderness. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. How do the time period and setting of *A Land So Wide* contribute to the story?
2. The female characters in *A Land So Wide*—Greer, Louise, Ailie—often find themselves subject to the whims of the men in their lives. How do their individual journeys reflect the restrictions their sex puts on them?
3. In what ways are Greer's and Ailie's stories different and in what ways are they the same? Do you relate more to Greer or Ailie? How and why?
4. Mistaken represents security, while the world outside the Warding Stones represents danger—but also freedom. How is Greer's internal dilemma reflected in the conflict between these two ideas?

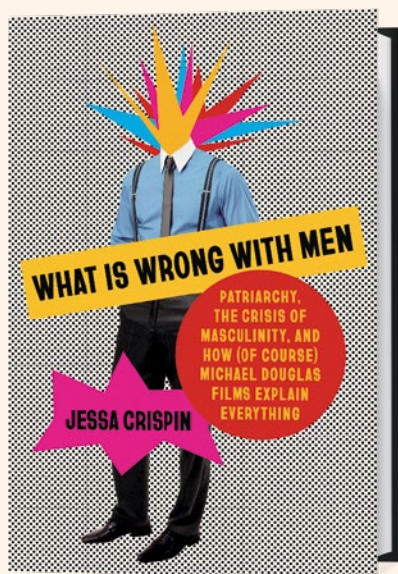

ABOUT THE BOOK:

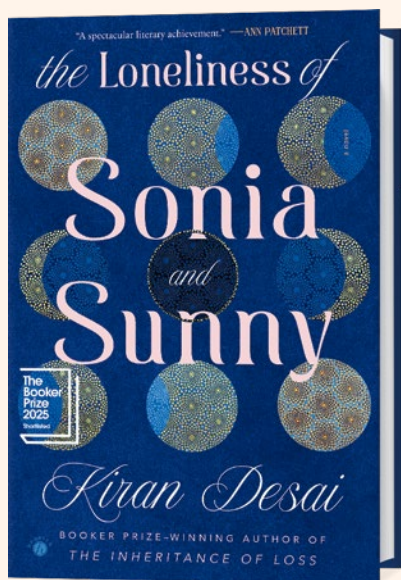
How to be a Man? That question—and all the anxiety, anger, and resentment it stirs up—is the starting point for a crisis in masculinity that today manifests as misogyny, nativism, and corporate greed; gives rise to incels and mass shooters; and leads to panic over the rights of women and minorities. According to Jessa Crispin, it is the most important question of our time, and the answer to it might be found in an unlikely place: the films of Michael Douglas.

Blending feminist arguments and pop culture criticism, Crispin uses the iconic roles of Michael Douglas as a lens to explore men's and our culture's ongoing anxieties around women, money, and power.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. Which Michael Douglas role stood out to you the most and why?
2. Crispin argues that "masculinity is always in crisis." Do you agree? How does that resonate with the men (or masculine figures) in your life?
3. Choose one of the Michael Douglas films mentioned (*Fatal Attraction*, *Wall Street*, *Basic Instinct*, etc.). What does Douglas's character reveal about society's expectations of men in that era in that film? Could the story be told the same way today?
4. The book touches on gender as performance. What roles do you think men are expected to play now? Are there any roles they should play but don't?
5. In what ways does the book complicate or challenge your views on feminism and its ripple effects?

3. What role does art and creativity play in Sonia's journey? How does her relationship with the artist affect her?
4. Sunny's career as a journalist and his struggle with his family's expectations are central to his character. How do these elements shape his actions and choices?
5. How does Desai address themes of immigration and alienation in the novel? What insights does she offer about the immigrant experience?
6. Discuss the portrayal of tradition versus modernity in the book. How do Sonia and Sunny navigate these conflicting forces?

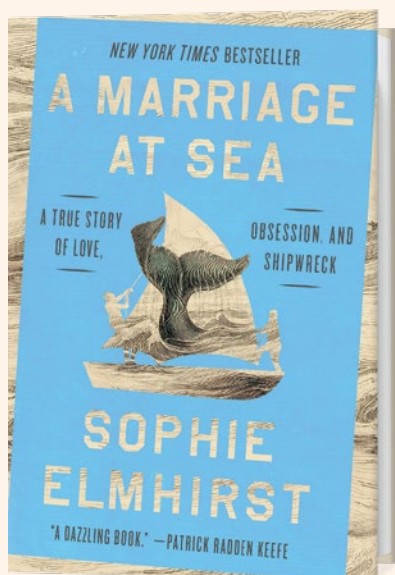

ABOUT THE BOOK:

Maurice and Maralyn make an odd couple. He's a loner, awkward and obsessive; she's charismatic and ambitious. But they share a horror of wasting their lives. And they dream—as we all dream—of running away from it all.

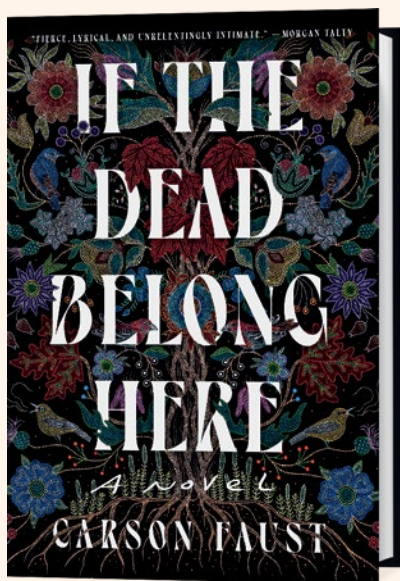
Most of us begin and end with the daydream. But Maurice began to study nautical navigation. Maralyn made detailed lists of provisions. And in June 1972, they set sail. For nearly a year all went well, until deep in the Pacific, a breaching whale knocked a hole in their boat and it sank beneath the waves.

What ensues is a jaw-dropping fight to survive in the wild ocean, with little hope of rescue. Alone together for months in a tiny rubber raft, starving and exhausted, Maurice and Maralyn have to find not only ways to stay alive but ways to get along, as their inner demons emerge and their marriage is put to the greatest of tests. Although they could run away from the world, they can't run away from themselves.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. Why did Maralyn and Maurice want to untether themselves from 1970s British society?
2. The acute stress of their situation unearths and intensifies parts of Maurice and Maralyn, good and bad—his self-sabotage, her fortitude. How does partnership operate to simultaneously reveal our innermost capabilities and exacerbate our greatest weaknesses?
3. Several ships sail past Maurice and Maralyn without rescuing them. What effect did these repeated failed attempts at rescue and dramatic fluctuations in hope have on you, the reader?
4. After Maralyn's death, Maurice learned that "he did not know how to live." How does the loss of Maralyn push him to take charge of his own survival, in ways he wasn't quite able to when they were lost in the ocean? What is communicated in that irony?

ABOUT THE BOOK:

When six-year-old Laurel Taylor vanishes without a trace, her family is left shattered, struggling to navigate the darkness of grief and unanswered questions. As their search turns to despair, Laurel's older sister, Nadine, begins experiencing nightmares that blur the line between dream and reality, and she becomes convinced that Laurel's disappearance could be connected to other family tragedies. Guided by her elders, Nadine sets out to uncover whether laying the ghosts to rest is the key to finding her sister and healing her fractured family.

Steeped in Indigenous folklore and drawing from the author's own family history, *If the Dead Belong Here* examines what it means to be haunted—both by the supernatural and by terrors of our own making.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. In *If the Dead Belong Here*, the Taylor family's personal tragedies collide with the enduring traumas that haunt Indigenous people in America. How do the specters of colonization, assimilation, and their forced removal from their ancestral homeland shape the ways that the Taylor family continues to be haunted?
2. The motif of wounds recurs throughout the book: Elgone and her daughters tend to people's wounds. Morgan, wounded from his car crash, materializes in front of Ayita. Ayita is described as "a wound in the shape of a body." How does imagery of wounds and scars tie into the book's themes?
3. Why was it important that Nadine and Rosebud traveled to South Carolina as part of their search? What did they gain from returning to their family's homeland?
4. Did the ending surprise you? Would you consider the Taylor family "healed" by the end of the book?

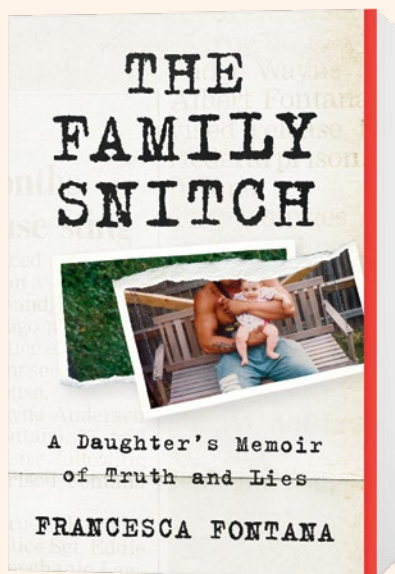

ABOUT THE BOOK:

The first in her family to attend college, *The Family Snitch* started as a youthful experiment in journalistic investigation, as Francesca began to uncover her father's secret criminal past. But in her increasingly dogged pursuit of the truth at any cost, was she just selling everybody out?

In her thought-provoking exploration, Francesca also interrogates her own relationship to the truth, finding that she trusts almost no one and refuses to believe anything that can't be backed by hard evidence. She turns to experts on memory and psychology, in search of someone to help explain the secrets kept between parents and children, and the inheritances they leave us in the fallout of their choices. She pulls on the threads that lead her back through the forms that came before this one: theater and film, Greek tragedy and myth.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. Throughout the book, the author struggles with various forms of "truth," with journalistic, fact-driven truth clashing with personal, memory-driven truth. How do different types of truth clash throughout the book?
2. Francesca's parents represent opposing worldviews regarding the past: her mother kept hers hidden, while her father celebrated his larger-than-life past. How did your family deal with privacy, secrets, and the past?
3. Throughout the book, the author alternates between telling her story from a first-person perspective and reconstructing events from the past in the third-person. Why do you think she chose to shift perspectives in this way? How did it affect your experience as a reader?
4. Do you think Francesca is a reliable narrator? Why or why not?

Almost thirty, slightly aimless, and stuck in a basement apartment in Queens, she's forced to return to River Hill, her one-square-mile New Jersey hometown, to sit shiva. Cammy's fraught relationship with her mother, Beth, has never been easy. And now, with her beloved father gone, she would rather be anywhere but back in her childhood room, in a house filled with guests noshing on snacks and offering their condolences. So Cammy does whatever she can to make it through seven turbulent days of mourning.

Amid getting stoned, reconnecting with her best friend and her high school crush, evading the rabbi, and spending a debauched night in Atlantic City, Cammy must reckon with her roots—with the place she fled for the glamour of New York, where she thought she belonged. But is she really any better off than those she left behind? While navigating the swirl of emotions that accompany grief, Cammy also uncovers hidden truths about her father, which lead her to doubt how well she knew the man she adored. Then again, does she even know herself?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

1. After her beloved father's death, Cammy is supposed to be sitting shiva—the Jewish mourning ritual—but goes out of her way to avoid it. While such rituals can bring comfort and community, they can also be challenging and overwhelming. How do you relate to this experience?
2. At age twenty-nine, Cammy is still trying to figure out her life, and she makes many mistakes over the course of the novel before finally achieving some growth. What does it mean to go through this “second coming of age” in one's late twenties or early thirties?
3. In the wake of her dad's passing, Cammy reluctantly heads back to her small hometown of River Hill, New Jersey. What are some of the joys and anxieties of returning home?

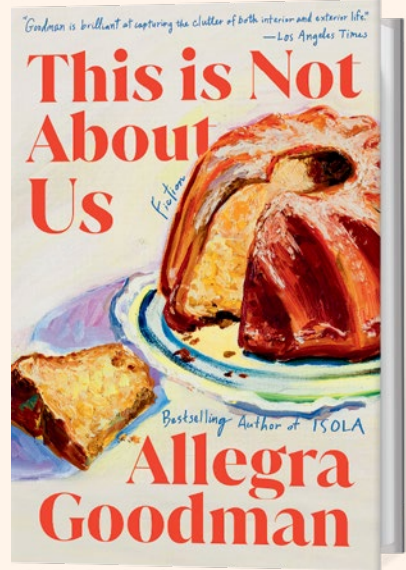

4. Dadu and Mishti embody opposite ends of the age spectrum. How does each experience and interpret the crisis differently? What does their relationship reveal about resilience across generations?

3. Can you share a moment or passage that changed or deepened your understanding of how food, land, and identity are connected?
4. Did the combination of cooking instructions, personal stories, and historical context help you "experience" these foods in a different way than a standard cookbook or history book might? How so?

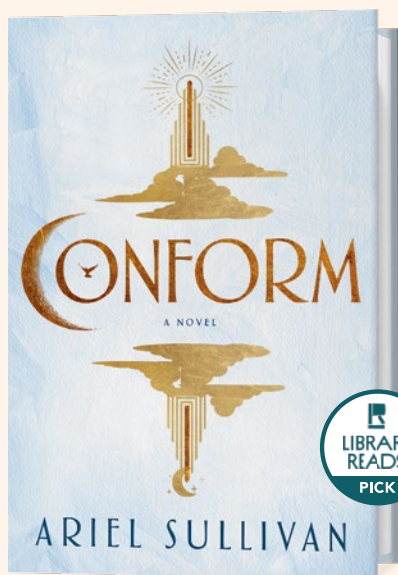

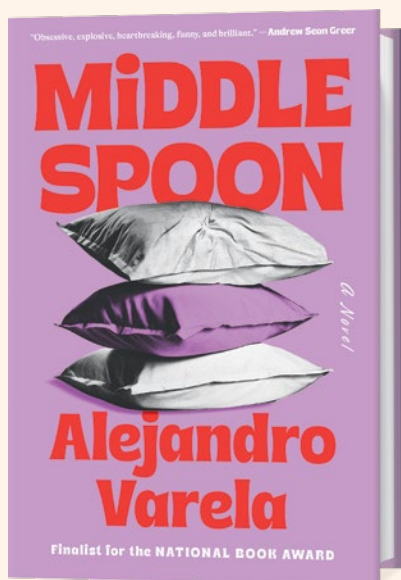

3. Do you suspect there's something larger at play with Emeline being chosen as the first Illum mate in years? Why do you think they chose her?
4. What does the novel suggest about the cost of love in a society built and reliant on complete control? What do you think that reflects about the nature of love?

2. How do Ben and the narrator's husband occupy different niches in the narrator's life? What needs do they each fulfill, and how do they complement each other? Do you think the narrator is unrealistic or selfish in hoping that these needs get met?
3. *Middle Spoon* is told through a series of email drafts penned to the narrator's ex-boyfriend. What did you think of the choice to tell this story in this way? How does this format affect the way you understand the narrator's journey? What details and perspectives are left out?
4. What did you think of the book's resolution? Do you think that the narrator has figured out a sustainable arrangement among his husband, his family, and Ben?
